However there continues to be a shortfall of short and long term housing for disabled people living within the community. There are no single person hostels that can accommodate couples, including someone acting as a carer. In certain circumstances arrangements can be made to accommodate them separately within the same scheme to enable them to continue to provide care and support. In practice few people with disabilities that require a carer will be assisted through hostels other than in an emergency.
